2025 Joseph F. Fraumeni, Jr. Distinguished Achievement Award

Robert A. Hiatt, MD, PhD, University of California, San Francisco

The Joseph F. Fraumeni, Jr., Distinguished Achievement Award is presented to an outstanding scientist in the area of preventive oncology, cancer control and/or cancer prevention.

Dr. Hiatt is an Emeritus Professor of Epidemiology and Biostatistics at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF) and also the Associate Director of Population Sciences for the UCSF Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center (HDFCCC). He has been the Director of Population Sciences at the UCSF HDFCCC since 2003 and served as Chair of the UCSF Dept. of Epidemiology & Biostatistics from 2006-2017. His research and teaching interests are in breast cancer, health inequities, and the social and environmental determinants of cancer. From 1998-2003 he was the first deputy director of the U. S. National Cancer Institute's Division of Cancer Control and Population Sciences, where, among other things, he oversaw the extramural cancer epidemiology, health services research, and surveillance programs. Between 2003 and 2016 he led the Breast Cancer and the Environment Research Program and its Coordinating Center in San Francisco and served on the National Academy's Board of Environmental Studies and Toxicology from 2012-2018. He is a past president of the American Society of Preventive Oncology and the American College of Epidemiology from whom he received the Abraham Lilienfeld Award this year for distinguished service to the field of epidemiology. Currently at UCSF he is the Principal Investigator of the National Precision Medicine Initiative, All of Us, co-PI of the NCI's Persistent Poverty Initiative, and directs the San Francisco Cancer Initiative (SF CAN).



Joseph W. Cullen Memorial Award

Jamie S. Ostroff, PhD, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center

The Joseph W. Cullen Memorial Award is to recognize an individual's distinguished achievement in continued national tobacco control efforts, through research, through the development of prevention and cessation programs with wide-reaching public health impact, or through public policy and advocacy initiatives.

Dr. Jamie Ostroff is the Chief of Behavioral Sciences Service, Director of the Tobacco Treatment, Training and Research Lab in the Department of Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences and Co-Leader of the Population Sciences Research Program at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center (MSKCC). Her clinical, research and training activities focus on addressing barriers and facilitators of high-quality implementation of tobacco treatment in cancer care and lung cancer screening settings, with particular attention to equity in access, utilization and cessation outcomes. Her CV lists over 240 journal peer-reviewed publications as well as invited presentations. Dr. Ostroff is a fellow of the Society of Behavioral Medicine, the Society for Research on Nicotine & Tobacco and the American Psychosocial Oncology Society. In 2022, she was awarded the Society of Behavioral Medicine, Cancer Special Interest Group's Distinguished Senior Investigator Award. She was recently awarded the Ruth McCorkle Excellence in Research Mentorship Award from the American Psychosocial Oncology Society. She holds several national leadership positions including service to National Lung Cancer Roundtable, Commission on Cancer Just/ Beyond ASK Task Force and the NCI-funded Cancer Centers Cessation Initiative (C3I).



ASPO Distinguished Service Award

Henry P. Ciolino, PhD

Distinguished Service Awards are given periodically to those individuals who have gone above and beyond in their service to the Society.

Dr. Henry P. Ciolino earned a Ph.D. in Anatomy and Cell Biology from the Louisiana State University Medical School in New Orleans, LA., and completed postdoctoral training in the laboratory of Dr. Rodney L. Levine in the Laboratory of Biochemistry of the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute. Moving to the National Cancer Institute, he became a Staff Scientist in the Laboratory of Metabolism before joining the faculty of the University of Texas at Austin Department of Nutritional Sciences. There, he ran an NCI-funded laboratory that studied the effect of dietary agents on the metabolic pathway mediated by the aryl hydrocarbon receptor. He returned to the NCI in 2010 in the Office of Cancer Centers (OCC) and became Director of the OCC in 2015. As Director, he oversaw an extensive revision of the Cancer Center Support Grant in 2016, formulated new ways to fund cancer centers that resulted in significant increases in their funding, and introduced four new components to the Cancer Center Support Grant that transformed centers: Community Outreach and Engagement, Cancer Research Training and Education Coordination, Shared Resource Management, and the Plan to Enhance Diversity.

Many Shades of Pink

Wendy Shurelds

Wendy Shurelds, a mother of two and breast cancer survivor, is the Founder of Many Shades of Pink, a San Diego-based nonprofit dedicated to revolutionizing breast health for women of color. Diagnosed with breast cancer in 2013, Wendy has since become a passionate advocate for all women, focusing on education, empowerment, and access to critical breast health resources. With over 30 years of experience in healthcare, Wendy has made a profound impact on her community, helping provide mobile mammography and preventive health services to women and men. Her commitment to advocacy extends to co-founding the Monthly Community Health and Resource Fair at Jackie Robinson YMCA, San Diego, which has been addressing healthcare disparities in underserved communities since 2017. Wendy's work has earned her numerous accolades, including the President's Lifetime Achievement Award (2024). Wendy is also a co-author, advocate, and an activist for workplace safety, having helped write the first Family Bill of Rights adopted by OSHA. Wendy's leadership continues to inspire change and support breast cancer survivors and their families.



To Life! Tasha Ostapczuk

Tasha Ostapczuk has worked closely with the Capital Region community through organizations such as Cancer Services Program, Unlimited Care, Inc., Fidelis and Girl Scouts of Northeastern NY. In her current role as Program Director with To Life!, a breast cancer support organization, Tasha provides wellness, educational and social programming for those dealing with a breast cancer diagnosis. She believes in the power of connection, both in business and personally. In addition to her full-time career, Tasha owns an event planning business, as well as freelances as a mindful meditation guide, bartender, school enrichment instructor and face painter. She lives in Saratoga Springs, NY with her 4 'fur' kids.



Big Mike's Bottom Line

Michael Kropp, Jr.

Michael Kropp, Jr. is a U.S. Navy pilot and flight instructor stationed in Texas. Originally from Sacramento, CA, he grew up with his brother, Alex, and their parents, Mary Beth and Michael. He attended the University of Southern California through the ROTC program and has completed two overseas deployments as a P-8A Poseidon pilot. Inspired by the wisdom of his father, "Big Mike," Michael is dedicated to using his platform to make a meaningful impact. This commitment led him to co-found Big Mike's Bottom Line, an nonprofit organization focused on raising awareness about colon health and the prevention of colorectal cancer (CRC).

With CRC rates increasing among individuals aged 20 to 49, Michael is passionate about shifting the conversation around early detection—particularly within the military community, where the risk is often underestimated. Big Mike's Bottom Line emphasizes that CRC is both preventable and treatable when detected early. "Too many young people are dying from this disease," he says, "but we have the power to change that trajectory.

Diane Crawford is a 15-year cervical cancer survivor and the founder of The Crawford Crew, a nonprofit dedicated to ending HPV-related cancers. Her personal journey fueled her passion for advocacy, leading her to establish TCC in 2009 to raise awareness and foster partnerships in cancer prevention. Beyond her nonprofit work, Diane serves on national and international committees focused on gynecologic cancer research and prevention. She lives in Westerville, OH, with her husband and enjoys connecting with others, playing tennis, and spending time with family and friends.

Dr. Abreu is the president, Chief executive officer, and the Founder of the Latino Health Insurance Program, Inc (LHIP) in 2006. She completed her medical degree in 1995 and her Master of Public Health from Boston University in 2010. She has dedicated her career to providing high-quality and accessible medical care for minority residents in Massachusetts.

She is a former chair of the Massachusetts Medical Society, Committee on Ethnic Diversity; Executive committee member of the Massachusetts Healthy Aging Collaborative; member of the Community Engagement Advisory Board for the Center for Cancer Equity and Engagement (CCE), The Zhu Family Center for Global Cancer Prevention Advisory Board member, and Advisory Board member of the Massachusetts Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA) in Framingham, MA.

In 2006, Dr. Abreu founded the Latino Health Insurance Program. LHIP has assisted 95,000 families with access to healthcare, chronic disease prevention, disease management, vaccine administration, and nutritional programs since insertion.

Many organizations have recognized Dr. Abreu for her tremendous efforts to reduce health care disparities and enhance public health, including the Massachusetts Black & Latino Legislative Caucus, Framingham Medical Reserve Corps, City of Boston, Massachusetts State Senate, Massachusetts Medical Society, and Massachusetts Immigrant and Refugee Advocacy Coalition, and others.

Dr. Abreu worked for Boston University, Boston Medical Center, and received her master's degree in epidemiology from Boston University School of Public Health.
