

Erin E. Kent is an Associate Professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at the UNC Gillings School of Global Public Health and Member of the Lineberger Comprehensive Center Cancer Prevention and Control Program. Dr. Kent is an epidemiologist and health services researcher who conducts mixed methods research on the impact of cancer on cancer survivors and their families. Dr. Kent leads a program of patient- and family-centered outcomes research and community engaged scholarship. Dr. Kent is currently leading studies to improve support provision to rural families affected by cancer. Prior to working at UNC, Dr. Kent served as a Program Director and Scientific Advisor for the Outcomes Research Branch at the National Cancer Institute (NCI). There, Dr. Kent worked to establish funding opportunities and research resources to better understand the that caregivers face and develop family-centered interventions for cancer patients and their caregivers. Dr. Kent served as Chair of the ASPO Survivorship and Health Outcomes Research Special Interest Group from 2018-2020 and organized webinars on creation and use of data linkages to study cancer survivorship (2019) and survivorship care for those living with metastatic disease (2020). She also served on the Program Planning Committee for the ASPO 2020 virtual annual meeting and co-planned sessions on financial hardship among cancer survivors, precision medicine and population health, and lifestyle research to improve outcomes among cancer survivors. As a candidate for the Director-at-Large position with the ASPO Executive Committee, Dr. Kent would participate in all executive meetings and work to liaise with several partnering organizations and agencies. She would work to continue to bring a health equity lens across the cancer prevention and control continuum to ensure that ASPO members work improves the lives of all populations affected by cancer. She would strive to not only increase membership but also enrich the value that current ASPO members, in particular student and early-career members, experience from attending ASPO meetings and events.
