

Dr. Salma Shariff-Marco is a Professor in the Department of Epidemiology & Biostatistics at the University of California, San Francisco. She is also the co-Director for the Biostatistics & Population Shared Resource of the Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center and a co-Investigator of the Greater Bay Area Cancer Registry. Dr. Shariff-Marco was trained as a social and behavioral scientist and completed the Cancer Prevention Fellowship Program at NCI. Her research aims to examine and address the structural and social drivers of health as they relate to cancer disparities in racial/ethnic, socioeconomic status and immigrant groups. In particular, her work has focused on the impact of structural racism and neighborhood attributes on outcomes across the cancer control spectrum. Dr. Shariff-Marco is currently PI/MPI of 3 R01s investigating the impact of structural racism, residence in ethnic enclaves, and other multilevel factors on cancer disparities, with outcomes ranging for incidence to mortality. She is also an MPI on the first national cancer etiologic cohort study among Asian Americans—the ASPIRE Cohort.

Dr. Shariff-Marco is an associate editor at the British Journal of Cancer and serves on the Council for the California Breast Cancer Research Program. She has served on several study sections for grant reviews for NIH and other organizations as well as provided abstract reviews for national conferences, including ASPO. Dr. Shariff-Marco is also committed to training the next generation of researchers addressing cancer disparities and has mentored trainees across all levels, from high school through early investigators.
