

Suzanne O'Neill, PhD is a tenured Professor in the Department of Oncology at Georgetown University and a member of the Cancer Prevention and Control Program at the Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center, where she is co-director of their NCI T32-funded Cancer Population Science Postdoctoral Training Program. A clinical psychologist with postdoctoral training in public health, Dr. O'Neill's research focuses on developing and testing interventions to support care delivery of precision cancer screening as well as germline and somatic genomic testing. This work has been supported by the National Cancer Institute, American Cancer Society and Prevent Cancer Foundation.

Dr. O'Neill has served on the Editorial Boards of Health Psychology and Annals of Behavioral Medicine as well as study sections at the National Institutes of Health, American Cancer Society and international funding agencies. Her teaching portfolio focuses on the areas of health psychology, behavioral science, and cancer prevention and control. She currently serves as Chair of the Social and Behavioral Track within the Master's in Epidemiology Program and Director of Education and Training for Cancer Population Sciences at Georgetown University.

Dr. O'Neill received her PhD in Clinical Psychology from the University of Delaware, followed by postdoctoral training at the UNC Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center and the National Human Genome Research Institute/National Institutes of Health. She joined ASPO as a postdoctoral fellow in 2004, serving as the Chair of the Junior Career Development Interest Group and member of the ASPO Executive Committee from 2009-2011, Chair of the Nominating Committee in 2011 and as a member of Program Committee for the 2025 Annual Meeting. She would value continued service to ASPO, fostering multidisciplinary collaboration across the Special Interest Groups and Committees of the organization and promoting the priorities of the ASPO membership.
